### **DEEP C'S DIRECTOR - STEVE CRUIKSHANK**

Hello All,

Fall fishing has been rather good to me. I was able to get out Last week with Todd L and Dave J. The first time we went we found the Walleyes in 40 to 50 feet of water, which I thought was rather deep. We found out from a bait store that the lake had recently turned over so that would explain why. We caught a bunch of nice Walleyes between 14 and 16 inches. The next time Todd L and I went out to the same lake {You Wish You Knew} we tried the same spot we had caught them the last time we were out. No luck at 40 to 50 feet. We did not even mark any fish on the locator. The sun was out and not a cloud in the sky. The lake was so calm it looked as if you could step out of the boat and walk on top of the water. Not one ripple. So, we started going deeper. 50 feet no fish. 55 feet no fish. 60 feet no fish 65 feet no fish. Then at 68 feet and I felt a hit when I tried to set the hook I missed so I let the shiner back down and this time there was no doubt I had her on. I looked over at Todd and said 68 feet you got to be kidding me. He laughed and got the net ready. I brought her up slow but when we got her in the boat you could see her swim bladder was in her



mouth. We measured her at 28". We took a couple quick picks and released her. She swam down a few feet but floated back to the surface. We put her in the live well since she was a legal fish to see if that would help revive her. I dropped my line back down and hooked another big fish. This time I really went slow brining her up. Todd netted her and she measured 24". When We released her, she swam down 10 feet but floated



back to the surface. I was very bummed. I looked again to see if her swim bladder was sticking out of her throat and it was not. We could not put her in the live well because she was an illegal fish for the lake we were on. At that point I remembered when fishing in Alaska Mike M our captain put a down rigger ball in the illegal fishes mouth and sent it back to the bottom and then ierked the ball out of the fishes mouth. So. I took another rod with a snap swivel on the end of the line and attached 3, 3oz bottom bouncers to the snap swivel and then poked one of the ends of the bottom bouncer through her cheek and put the little yellow cap back on the end to keep the weight attached to her mouth. We let her down slow. When the weights hit the bottom, I could tell she was swimming around and pulling on the line, so I jerked the rod to remove

the weights and reeled them up. It had worked. A few minute later I was looking into the water when I saw this little yellow thing floating to the surface. What are the chances that cap would come to the surface right next to the boat? I believe it was God letting us know for sure we had successfully released that fish. We decided to move back to the spot we had tried earlier because we didn't want to catch any more big fish and the wind started to pick up so we thought maybe they would move back up shallower. No such luck. At that point it was time to go home, but what a day on the water. We loaded up the boat and left for home. The boat is in for winterization so the only way I am going to get out anymore is if someone else uses their boat. Call me. LOL.

As some of you may know, I am planning to retire from FFL in January 2022. Jan wants to move somewhere warmer; she does not do well in the cold. I

must admit that winter has been getting harder for me every year as well. I believe the state of Deep C's will go on without a hitch after I retire. The Chapter Coordinators will continue



to organize and run the meetings and I will work with whomever Tom might hire as the new men's ministry director to replace me. I have been abundantly blessed by all your friendships. Please know this has been one of the hardest decisions I have had to make. I look forward to spending the next year with all of you.

Pro Fishing Tips Oct 2020 by Dwight Nelson

# Hey! Don't put away that boat quite yet!!

If you have not gotten around to putting the boat to bed for the winter, you may not want to quite yet. There is still time for some great fall fishing.



But first, I want to share an experience with you all that I hope you will not have to go through. My wife Pam and I have lived in the city of Saint Paul for several decades and we live is what statistically is the safest area of town.

A couple of weeks ago I was all set to go fishing on a Friday at lunchtime. I had all my fishing tackle and rods in the car and the boat hitched up. I locked the car which was sitting in my driveway and ran into the house for some lunch. When I came back out I found that someone had smashed the window of my car and taken what turns out to be a fairly large amount of tackle and a fish finder.

In spite of the dollar value and sentimental value of all the tackle and equipment taken, I think it was the peace God has given me as a Christian that I didn't get bent out of shape about the whole event. That's not to say the thing hasn't been a big pain, not only from an insurance standpoint but also in re-creating a system that has been "in the works" for over 10 years.

The take away from all this: 1) Take pictures of all your gear, preferably with you in the pictures. 2) Know your insurance. If you have a "replacement" policy, find out what that really means. In my case it does not mean replacement as you or I would define it. 3) If you have a policy on your boat, review it and see what it really covers.

So if you see a large number of X-Raps, Shallow Shads, Tail Dancers (the all time best lure!) or an old Matrix 97 finder (which was great as a contour map GPS) for sale give me a call! OK, enough on that.

#### **Fall Fishing:**

As someone said, fall fishing is not for the frail or faint of heart. There are no "fair weather" fishermen/women out there this time of year. I am convinced though that it is one of the best times of the year for great fishing.

There are many ways to stay warm in cold weather fishing. One way is to put on those ice fishing bibs! Another thing you can do is to put one of those car seat heaters on your boat seat. If you can find an old Coleman Focus 5 heater they work great in a boat. Just keep it away from the gas tank! Or bring a Buddy heater. Hand warmers are a must for me too, along with a thermos of hot chocolate.

I can't say enough about the St. Croix River. Sorry if I keep harping on that but river fishing of any sort has become one of my favorite forms of fishing. Right now on the lower St. Croix a buddy has been having multiple 50+ walleye/ sauger days. Most of them are on the small size but even so he is getting multiple fish over 20". That's pretty cool. And, the bite is still going on.

No matter where you are fishing walleyes, keep the presentation slow. Like a yo-yo slow. As the water gets colder you want a slower presentation. You also want a bait with a slower, sleeker and more subdued look. Once again, as in early spring, Rapala Husky Jerks shine. So do Smithwick Rogues and Bomber Long As.

My favorite lure, the Rapala Tail Dancer can even be used this time of year with a minor modification. It normally has a wide tail action, but if you put a half a night crawler on the back hook, it slows down and subdues that action. It also gives the bait some scent and makes it even more tantalizing! Putting it on the middle treble is less subdued.

As a pro fisherman friend of mine puts it, this time of year start thinking of where you would be ice fishing. If that is in 20 or 30 feet of water, you can still troll with the old standard Rapala Floating Minnow. Here's how: Tie a 3-5 ounce trolling weight on a 3 way swivel with 10-12" of light line. Tie or hook your main line (braid is best) to the 2nd eye of the swivel. Tie a 5' leader to the 3rd eye of the swivel and connect your lure of choice to that. Using this method you can troll almost any lure at any depth. Jerk baits are great since they suspend. Just keep it slow. Slow down to 1-1.5 MPH and let the lure lumber along.

For those who fish crappies, 10"+ crappies are all over the place out there on the river. In multiple locations my screen is just lit up with them hovering from 20-35+ feet in 35+ feet of water. Sometimes they will even hit a 5" crankbait trolled through them!

For those who like to fish muskies this time of year – and it is a great time to do that, I'll quickly mention one method. A friend and his son love to hit a clear Brainerd lake in October dragging big suckers around the lake. They are hooked with a Quick Strike rig (various methods) under a 2" bobber. They get amazing results.

### **November TO DO list:**

Night fishing Lake Minnetonka, Wayzata bay shoreline (flicker shads, shad raps) and very shallow stick baits on Horseshoe reef. Then put boat to bed

### **Smoked Pheasant**

This is a hot-smoking method, essentially a really slow, smoky barbecue. Instead of barbecue sauce, which you could of course us if you wanted to, I use maple syrup instead. This creates a nice sweet glaze for the smoke to adhere to as the bird cooks. You must use plucked pheasants for this recipe. It will not work with skinned birds, as they will get too dry. If you are not a hunter but want to make this, you can use a high-quality domestic chicken (regular supermarket ones are too soft and flabby) or you can buy a whole pheasant online or in some supermarkets.

### Ingredients


2 whole pheasants
1/4 cup kosher salt, about 2 1/4 ounces
1/4 cup brown sugar
4 cups water
2 cups maple syrup, boiled down to 1 cup

#### Instructions

Dissolve the salt and sugar in the water. Find a lidded container just about large enough to hold both pheasants. Cover them with the brine and let this sit in the fridge for at least 12 hours and up to 18 hours.

OPTIONAL: Weigh the pheasant and the water you intend to brine it in; you'll have to guess, so err on more water. Now dissolve 2 percent of that total weight -- pheasant + water -- in kosher salt in the water, then brine. This method allows you to brine the bird for days without it getting too salty.

Take the pheasants out of the brine. Set on a cooling rack under a ceiling fan or in a breezy place and let them dry for an hour or so. You can also put the birds in a container uncovered in the fridge overnight. This drying process is an important step. You want the bird damp and tacky on the outside, not soaking wet. Smoke the pheasants over the wood of your choice – I prefer apple, hickory or pecan – for at least 3 hours, and up to 5 hours. You want a relatively warm smoke, between 200°F and 250°F. Let the pheasants smoke for 1 hour before painting on the maple syrup, then



baste with the syrup every 30 minutes afterward. When the pheasants reach an internal temperature of 160°F in the thigh meat, take them out of the smoker. Put them on a cooling rack and baste them with maple syrup one more time. Wait at least 20 minutes before eating. They are excellent cold, too.

### Notes

Note: This recipe also works with chukars, grouse and partridges, but not turkeys.

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
