

Grilled Walleye Fish Tacos



Walleye tacos Ingredients:

- Four 6-ounce walleye fillets (2 whole fillets cut in half)
- 2 TBS extra virgin olive oil (EVOO)
- 2TBS fresh cilantro, minced
- Juice of 1 small lime
- 1 tsp dried chili powder
- 1/4 tsp sea salt
- 1/4 tsp cracked black pepper
- Pinch of cayenne
- 6 flour or corn tortillas

Topping Ideas:

- 1 cup of your favorite salsa (or the recipe that follows)
- 1 avocado, cut into thin slices
- 1 cup thinly sliced romaine lettuce
- 3/4 cup plain yogurt
- 1 cup shredded cheese (Monterey Jack or Cheddar)

Directions:

- 1. In a food processor or mini chopper, combine the fresh herbs, salt and pepper, spices, lemon juice, and EVOO. Pulse these ingredients into a sauce. Coat the fish all over with the herb and EVOO mixture. Set the fish aside and prepare your toppings. Place toppings in serving bowls.
- 2. Preheat your grill to high. Grill the fish for approximately 5 minutes or until fillets flake easily with a fork. Transfer the fillets to a cutting board and cut into 1- or 2-inch pieces.
- 3. Warm up the tortillas on the grill. It's ok if they overlap.
- 4. Assemble by placing a tortilla on a plate, then some fish, and add with your favorite toppings. Fold over and

Easy Tomato Salsa Ingredients:

- 10 ripe plum tomatoes
- Juice of 1 medium lime
- 1 TBS extra virgin olive oil

- 1/4 medium red onion
- 1 small jalapeno pepper
- 1 clove garlic
- · Sea salt to taste

Directions:

- 1. Cut the tomatoes into quarters. Slice the onion. Cut the jalapeno in half. Peel the garlic.
- 2. Place all the ingredients in a food processor. Pulse until well combined, but still chunky. Add salt to taste. Serve with the tacos.





Fly Fishing for Muskies with Greg Lonke

Greg Lonke learned how to fish from his dad when he was 5 years old but he learned how to fly fish later in life from his brother in law. Growing up in

Crystal and being a Robbinsdale High School grad, he can honestly say he is a Minnesota native. He has lived here all his life.

In fact, Greg has been in the MN fishing business for much of his life. While starting out in insurance, he thought it would be fun to work in fishing and sporting goods and so he started at Burger Brothers, soon becoming the manager of their flagship store in Edina. After 20 years or so with them, he moved to Galyan's.

People would come into the store asking questions of course on fly fishing so in 1995 Greg started teaching fly fishing, teaming up with Tallakson's Trout ponds in Becker, MN.

I asked Greg how he got interested in fly fishing for Muskies. He replied that although he guided for trout, at some point he got tired of fishing for just trout (although he still does so to this day). He had equated "fly fishing" with "fishing for trout" and he would find out the two are not synonymous.

Greg bought a jon boat and became a true "river rat" fishing for Small Mouth Bass (SMB) on the river. One particular year rain took its toll on the river. So Greg bought a cheap 10 weight fly rod (a fairly heavy rod) and a transom mounted trolling motor and went over to Lake Harriet in Minneapolis to fish.

20 minutes into his fishing trip, Greg landed a 40" musky on a fly. He was hooked on Musky fishing! He would admit that over the years his tactics and presentation have evolved and changed from that day, but

Greg was willing to sit down with me and share some of his secrets. Having said that be sure that



there are many different ways of fishing and this is what has worked good for him through the years.

The Hardware: Greg still suggests using a 10 weight fly rod although some Muskie anglers use up to 13 wt rods. He typically will cast 8-9" flies (streamers in this case). A good rod will run in the \$100-200



range while a reel will run less than \$100. *The secret Greg says is in the line*. (That will run you \$50-100.)

Start out with what is called a "weight forward" sinking tip line. While you do not have to get this fancy, Greg's typical line is segmented so that at the end of his floating line, there is 10' of line that sinks at the rate of 1"/second. Next down the line is another segment of 10' that sinks at the rate of 2"/second. This is attached to 4' of 60# Fluorocarbon line with a nail knot (& UV glue). One could go "cheap" and just use a sinking tip line that drops 2-3'/second, but remember you only have to change this out every 10 years or so!

The next part is critical for success: At the end of the Fluorocarbon is a Perfection Loop knot. Another loop holds an 18" segment of tie-



able coated steel leader. At the other end of that leader is the fly/streamer. The loop knot has held up under the test of time and makes it easy to change in the field.

Figure eights at the boat are done just like other musky fishing with the rod tip in the water almost 2 feet, with something like 2 feet or less of line out. Greg has had some phenomenal results fly fishing for muskies and is willing to share (to a point!!) his methods. You can sometimes still find him in the fly fishing department at Cabela's Rogers store on weekends . The rest of the time he tries to get out on local lakes and rivers in his "skinny water" jet boat looking for SMB, bluegills and yes even Muskies.

October Special Needs Column

Greetings from the Director's Desk. I hope September was good to you. With the summer fishing season just about wrapped up and ice fishing season coming soon I thought it would be a good idea to go back to the basics with the Minnesota DNR. According to their website (https://www.dnr.state.mn.us/fishing/index.html) You need to buy a Minnesota fishing license if you're 16 or older. Annual licenses allow you to fish from March 1 to the last day of February the following year. Lower-cost licenses are available for shorter time periods. There is an added cost to fish for trout, salmon or sturgeon.

To qualify for a resident fishing license you must:

- Have established a legal residence in Minnesota for at least the past 60 consecutive days.
- If 21 or older, possess a current Minnesota driver's license, state-issued identification card, or have a receipt for an application for a driver's license or state ID that is at least 60 days old.
- Be at least 16 years of age.

What if I go fishing in a state park?

According to https://www.dnr.state.mn.us/ state_parks/fishing.html, Minnesota residents can fish without a fishing license in most Minnesota State Parks, including ice fishing!

If the body of water requires a trout stamp, you will need a fishing license whether you are fishing for trout or for something else. If no trout stamp is required, a Minnesota resident may fish in a state park without a fishing license when:

- Fishing from shore or wading in water within the state park; or
- Fishing through the ice, from a boat or a float on a designated lake that is completely encompassed within a Minnesota state park.

Getting a vehicle permit for these parks.

According to https://www.dnr.state.mn.us/ state_parks/permit.html, a \$35 year-round vehicle permit provides unlimited visits to all 75 Minnesota state parks and recreation areas for a full year from the month of purchase.

By purchasing a vehicle permit, you help maintain and improve the natural resources, facilities, and education and outreach programs that make Minnesota's state parks among the best in the nation.

Vehicle permits are valid for one year from the month of purchase. Plus, you can receive a discount on additional year-round permits for other vehicles you own. Looking for the perfect gift for the outdoor enthusiast? Purchase a gift card!

Not a fan of windshield stickers? Now there's another option; the new MN State Parks and Trails license plate provides vou with unlimited visits to all 75 Minnesota state parks and recreation areas for an entire year, without requiring a sepa-



rate vehicle permit. Plus it helps fund the operations and maintenance of Minnesota state parks and trails!

Opportunities to learn how to fish.


