They were warm in tee shirts, ate pizza, played games, learned how to see a fish grab their wax worms on the electronics and caught crappies. We adults enjoyed fellowship and occasional visits from Fishing for Life people also out on the ice. When it was time to quit, they thanked me for a good time in the Ice Palace. They might try fishing in a mobile portable house sometime if they get to be hardcore ice fishermen, but that's not likely in Brazil. The Ice Palace will be waiting if they come back on furlough in the winter.

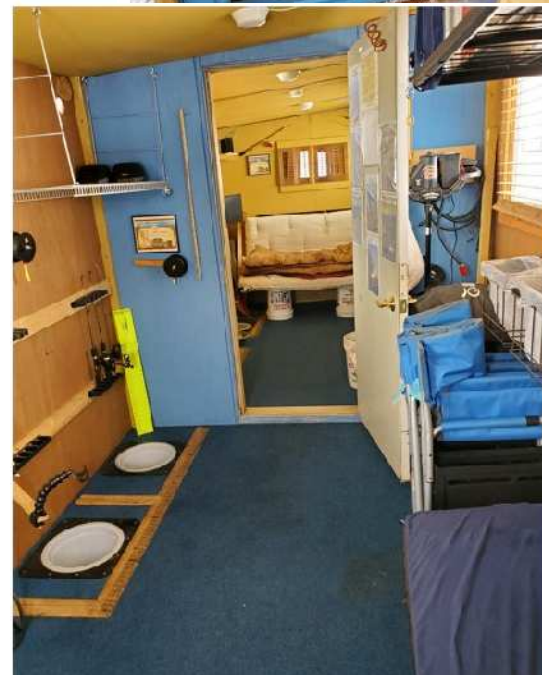

We love to have our assets used by all our volunteers.



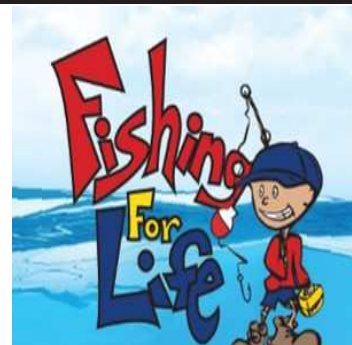

A challenge for us is not what we think will happen in the future; it's how we handle the circumstances facing us today.

Max Lucado heard the tale from a missionary in Brazil many years ago and included it in his book (appropriately titled) *In the Eye of the Storm* (Word Publishing, 1991. Unedited version below used with permission.)



Once there was an old man who lived in a tiny village. Although poor, he was envied by all, for he owned a beautiful white horse. Even the king coveted his treasure. A horse like this had never been seen before—such was its splendor, its majesty, its strength.

People offered fabulous prices for the steed, but the old man always refused. "This horse is not a horse to me," he would tell them. "It is a person. How could you sell a person? He is a friend, not a possession. How could you sell a friend?" The man was poor and the temptation was great. But he never sold the horse.

One morning he found that the horse was not in the stable. All the village came to see him. "You old fool," they scoffed. "We told you that someone would steal your horse. We warned you that you would be robbed. You are so poor. How could you ever hope to protect such a valuable animal? It would have been better to have sold him. You could have gotten whatever price you wanted. No amount would have been too high. Now the horse is gone, and you've been cursed with misfortune." The old man responded, "Don't speak too quickly. Say only that the horse is not in the stable. That is all we know; the rest is judgment. If I've been cursed or not, how can you know? How can you judge?" The people contested, "Don't make us out to be fools! We may not be philosophers, but great philosophy is not needed. The simple fact that your horse is gone is a curse." The old man spoke again. "All I know is that the stable is empty, and the horse is gone. The rest I don't know. Whether it be a curse or a blessing, I can't say. All we can see is a fragment. Who can say what will come next?" The people of the village laughed. They thought that the man was crazy. They had always thought he was a fool; if he wasn't, he would have sold the horse and lived off the money. But instead, he was a poor woodcutter, an old man still cutting firewood and dragging it out of the forest and selling it. He lived hand to mouth in the misery of poverty. Now he had proven that he was, indeed, a fool.

After 15 days, the horse returned. He hadn't been stolen; he had run away into the forest. Not only had he returned, he had brought a dozen wild horses with him. Once again, the village people gathered around the woodcutter and spoke. "Old man, you were right, and we were wrong. What we thought was a curse was a blessing. Please forgive us." The man responded, "Once again, you go too far. Say only that the horse is back. State only that a dozen horses returned with him, but don't judge. How do you know if this is a blessing or not? You see only a fragment. Unless you know the whole story, how can you judge? You read only 1 page. Can you judge the whole book? You read only one word of a phrase. Can you understand the entire phrase?"

"Life is so vast, yet you judge all of life with one page or one word. All you have is a fragment! Don't say that this is a blessing. No one knows. I am content with what I know. I am not perturbed by what I don't." You see only a fragment. Unless you know the whole story, how can you judge?

"Maybe the old man is right," they said to one another. So they said little. But down deep, they knew he was wrong. They knew it was a blessing. Twelve wild horses had returned with one horse. With a little bit of work, the animals could be broken and trained and sold for much money. The old man had a son, an only son. The young man began to break the wild horses. After a few days, he fell from one of the horses and broke both legs. Once again, the villagers gathered around the old man and cast their judgments. "You were right," they said. "You proved you were right. The dozen horses were not a blessing. They were a curse. Your only son has broken his legs, and now in your old age you have no one to help you. Now you are poorer than ever." The old man spoke again. "You people are obsessed with judging. Don't go so far. Say only that my son broke his legs. Who knows if it is a blessing or a curse? No one knows. We only have a fragment. Life comes in fragments."

It so happened that a few weeks later the country engaged in war against a neighboring country. All the young men of the village were required to join the army. Only the son of the old man was excluded, because he was injured. Once again, the people gathered around the old man, crying and screaming because their sons had been taken. There was little chance that they would return. The enemy was strong, and the war would be a losing struggle. They would never see their sons again.

"You were right, old man," they wept. "God knows you were right. This proves it. Your son's accident was a blessing. His legs may be broken, but at least he is with you. Our sons are gone forever."

The old man spoke again. "It is impossible to talk with you. You always draw conclusions. No one knows. Say only this: Your sons had to go to war, and mine did not. No one knows if it is a blessing or a curse. No one is wise enough to know. Only God knows."

The old man was right. We only have a fragment. Life's mishaps and horrors are only a page out of a grand book. We must be slow about drawing conclusions. We must reserve judgment on life's storms until we know the whole story.

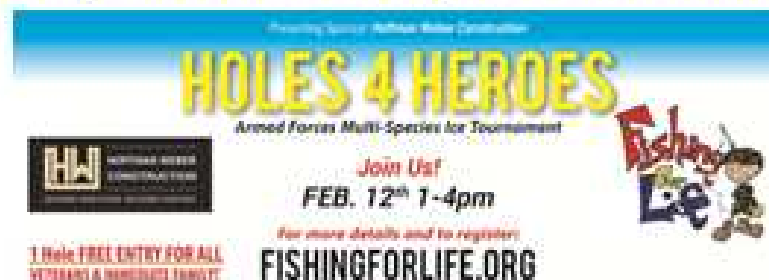

Top Secret Cooking

As a hunter, I have been cooking wild game for over 35 years, The planning, traveling, camaraderie and time spent in the great outdoors all contribute to the excitement and fulfillment of hunting. Many people are intimidated by the thought of preparing wild game. The concept is simple! Game meat should not be stored for too long, they need to be roasted at low heat or grilled and sauteed at moderated heat and should be served with complementary flavors

Fall Pheasant Breast Pizza

- 4 boneless, skinless pheasant breast
- 1 tsp. garlic salt
- 1 tsp. fresh pepper
- 1 cup flour
- 2 T. olive oil
- 2 large red onions, cut into ½ inch slices
- 2 large zucchini, cut into 4 inch X ½ inch slices
- 4 large fresh mushrooms, cut into ¼ inch slices
- 2 cups pizza sauce
- 2 tomatoes cut into ¼ inch slices
- 1 tsp. dry oregano
- 2 tsp. fresh basil
- 1 ½ cups pizza cheese

Place pheasant breast into a bag, one at a time and flatten with a mallet to about ¼ inch. Season with garlic salt and pepper. Roll in flour and shake off excess. Heat a large skillet with one tablespoon of olive oil. Add red onion slices and cook until tender. Remove to a plate. Add zucchini and mushrooms and cook til almost tender, but still crisp. Remove from pan. Add remaining olive oil and pheasant breast. Cook until golden brown. Remove breast to an oiled baking sheet. On top of each pheasant breast place 1 table spoon pizza sauce, 1 onion slice, 1 tomato, 1 zucchini strips and mushroom slices. Top with 2 tablespoons pizza sauce, spices and a generous amount of pizza cheese. Bake at 375 degrees for 20 minutes and serve.

Pro Fishing Tips and Ideas February 2022

Greetings! I hope you have been staying warm the last few weeks. It's almost time to get the extensions on the augers! While many lakes seem to have literally shut down with this cold snap some folks have found fishing to be good. I hear from some of our FFL friends that fishing has been very good on Lake of the Woods (LOTW).



Kids on (the) Ice!

For various reasons I have never been able to get my granddaughter out ice fishing. But this past January 15 I was able to get her out to Courthouse Lake for the inland trout opener and she had fun. She also caught her first rainbow trout. I was not able to get a picture with her and the trout because she wanted to get her line right back in the water! Take a kid fishing while you have the chance. It might start a lifelong interest or passion.



Cheap Ice Fishing Rod Holder

If you look at little closer at the picture above you can see my cheap "quick and dirty" ice fishing rod holder. It has worked very well for me and so I'll share the details. It is basically 2 flag holders from Menards screwed down to a 4" X 16" piece of treated plywood. The flag holders are adjustable so you can make them any angle that works for you. You can also put a small hole on each end for nailing into the ice with a pole barn nail. Options are endless!



Tips for Old Eyes

That would be tips for old eye balls not walleyes! It's getting pretty tough for these old eyes to see 2 or 3# line out on the lake. Here's a suggestion. Use a slightly heavier mainline and tie a loop knot in the end of it. At home, make some pre-made leaders out of 2-3# line with your favorite jigs or spoons on them. Put loop knots on these also at the opposite end of the jig. You

can now easily attach the jig to the mainline on the lake. (Put the loop on the leader through the loop on the mainline. Then put the jig through the loop on the end of the leader and slightly tighten).

Greenies for Loonies

I am not necessarily a proponent of going to other states or even other countries to go fishing. We have sooooo many lakes right here in Minnesota to explore and discover. However I thought I would share some information about a lake near Winnipeg (Manitoba) Canada which has some awesome walleyes. Lake Winnipeg, an enormous lake stretching some 265 miles end to end and covering over 9400 square miles has some equally enormous walleyes called Greenbacks.



While they are genetically no different than other walleyes, they have an iridescent, almost holographic green coloration to them. This is thought to be because of the limestone geology of the lake.

February and March are great times of the year to ice fish for greenbacks. Trophy sized fish are almost guaranteed! The walleye above was 30" long and weighed in at 11 pounds. My friend (pictured) is headed back in March. They usually catch 100 fish per day. Wow.



Miscellaneous

Minnesota walleye, sauger, northern pike and large-mouth bass seasons end Feb. 27. Stuck at home in the cold weather? Search YouTube for "brian klawitter sauger" for some awesome underwater videos. I hope to have some out there soon myself.

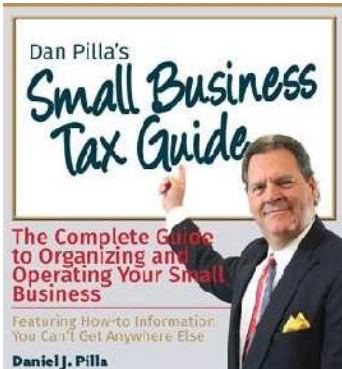
