Here are seven reasons from Colossians:
(To be thankful this lent season)

1. Because thankfulness to God for his grace at work among us has been modeled for us in the apostle Paul's own prayer for the



church: "We always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, when we pray for you" (1:3).

- 2. Because thankfulness is one of the marks of Christian living that is worthy of the Lord and fully pleasing to him: Paul prayed that the church would be "strengthened with all power, according to his glorious might, for all endurance and patience with joy; giving thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of the saints in light" (1:11–12).
- 3. Because thankfulness is the one accompanying virtue by which Paul summarizes a life lived by faith in the Lord Jesus Christ: "As you received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving" (2:6–7).

- 4. Because being thankful is essential to the relational peace and unity of the church: "Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body. And be thankful" (3:15).
- 5. Because heartfelt thankfulness is to be the note we strike in all our gospel teaching, encouragement, and worship songs: "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God" (3:16).
- 6. Because everything we do is to be done in the Name of the Lord Jesus with thanksgiving: "And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him" (3:17).
- 7. Because the prayer strategy for guarding against doubting Christ's all-sufficiency is continual thankfulness in prayer: "Continue steadfastly in prayer, being watchful in it with thanksgiving" (4:2).



Top Secret Cooking

I recently had the opportunity to do some late season Ice Fishing, with family and friends in South Dakota. This can be one of the best times to get a hot bite. Almost gone are the days of sub-zero temperatures, snow, and ice. Open water is on the way and the late ice bite has begun. This is the time of year when panfish go into feeding mode as they too wait for spring to arrive. If you are willing to keep the ice gear out just a few days longer, you too can take advantage of this amazing bite.

Sunfish Parmesan

Ingredients

- 1/4 cup butter, melted
- 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs
- 1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 2 tablespoons minced fresh parsley
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1/4 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1/4 teaspoon dried basil
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 pound bluegill or crappie

Directions

- Place butter in a shallow bowl. In another shallow bowl, combine the bread crumbs, cheese and seasonings. Dip fish in butter, then coat with crumb mixture.
- 2. Place in a greased 15x10x1-in. baking pan. Bake, uncovered, at 350° for 20 minutes or until fish flakes easily with a fork.

Cool info on tagged musky info for muskie mayhem event!



Courtnie,

I looked into this fish and it had a note that more info couldn't be found, but I was able to dig it up. Not sure why it wasn't found back in October though. Usually we respond fairly quickly on these tag reports, so sorry again for the delay, and thank you for reaching back out to us on this one.

This fish was tagged because it is part of a muskie stocking study in the metro area. DNR stocked fingerling (age-0 fish; approximately 10 – 11 inches) and yearling (age-1 fish, approximately 16-18 inches) fish at the same time, and are using angler tag reports to evaluate the contribution of the different sized fish to the fishery. We'll use that information to inform our stocking efforts in the future.

The following is the life history of this fish:

- 10/27/2010 stocked as a 14" fingerling that was hatched in 2010. (Age 0)
- 06/07/2016 angler caught and reported this fish as 37" in length. (Age 6)

- 10/09/2019 DNR fisheries research crew electrofished this fish and measured it as 40.5" long and 13.7 pounds. (Age 9)
- 10/20/2021 you caught this fish when it was 42" long. (Age 11)

This is really interesting since often we only have the size the fish was when stocked and then one catch report. This one we have 4 data points for now. We don't really know how long muskie live in Bald Eagle Lake, but this tagging study is helping shed some light on that. I suspect that it is less than 20 years though. We will be doing a 2-year population estimate on Bald Eagle Lake in 2022 and 2023. It will be interesting to see if we catch this fish again and if it has grown much, we may be able to tell if it is a female or male since we do our netting during the spawning season.

Fishing Tips and Ideas April 2022

Greetings!

What a great time of the year! The ice is melting, robins are showing up in droves in my yard and spring is here. I got sick of winter a couple of



weeks ago and got my boat out of storage March 15 – a record early date for me. It didn't take long to check things out and get a full tank of gas.

The great thing about living in Minnesota is that we can go ice fishing one day, trolling by boat the next day and ice fishing again the next day! I love living in Minnesota.

March 17 I headed down to the dam north of Red Wing. While the primary purpose of the trip was to check out the boat and the changes to the fish finder wiring and network I had made, I was happy to pick up a 18" walleye (the first of the season!) and a couple of smaller sauger. The sauger came on jigs and minnows. The walleye came on a blade bait. The water temperature was 38°F so I had to jig reeeaaal sloooow.

Blade baits rule on the river. If you have not tried them I highly encourage you to pick up a couple and give them a try. They are essential for colder waters



in rivers or lakes. I don't see any reason why they wouldn't water is still cold and especially in very turbid or cloudy wa-

ter. The vibration they put out is incredible. Of course there are many different styles now, all variants of the first Heddon Sonar that came out in the 1950s. Their lure was the first lure where an angler could change the action of the lure by changing the tie point. It is still useful and mimicked by others 60 years later.

Remember that walleyes spawn when the water temps reach 38-44°F so the spawn on the river will start real soon. So will the crowds at the dam in Pool 4! Until the first week of May that will be the only walleye action in town for awhile.

Crappies

Crappies spawn later than walleye at water temperatures of 58-64°F. Even so, the process has already started and soon, if not already, large females will start moving in to slightly warmer waters. While some think this is to spawn, early it is just because of food and very slightly warmer water.

Watch where the ice melts first on area lakes. Usually it is on the north side of the lake. That is a good direction to head for large crappies too. They move up in the water column as well to find temperatures that are even just 1°F warmer. When the sunlight pokes through the newly opened up water and the ice has gone, the surface water will warm ever so slightly.

On one lake I started fishing this past winter, guys were saying that last year Crappies were swimming no more that 6-12" under the surface of the water and very shallow. Crappies will move into bays as well where there is little wave action and the sun has warmed the water considerably.

Consider getting a very long pole to be able to pick off these large fish without even casting. (One vendor at the ice show was selling 16' Crappie rods!) If that is not possible put a small bobber on your line about a foot up from your bait (as simple as a hook & minnow & split shot or a 1/32 or 1/64oz jig & minnow) and cast beyond them, very slowly retrieving your bait through the pod. Remember to watch the water temps.

Special Reminders

If you have not purchased your 2022 fishing license, work on opener if the do so now! A special reminder too: If you are over 65 you do not need a trout license in Minnesota. In Wisconsin you need an inland and a Great Lakes license for trout if you fish those waters. You also need a paper copy of your license in WI. If you are fishing on the St. Croix River, St. Louis River, or the Mississippi (border waters) you only need a MN license. However, there are some special rules in each state that apply only to their side of the river. I hear some MN CO's have been allowing forgetful anglers to purchase their licenses on-line on the spot, but I would not count on that!

> If you are getting ready for open water, remember to replace all your mono line from last year. Exposure to the sun and elements causes it to decay in no time.




