Top Secret Cooking

While spring has come, the weather continues to be inconsistent maybe even a bit chilly. For me, it is never too late to serve up a bowl of soup for others to enjoy. Recently, I was discussing with a friend of mine, of what can be as fulfilling as a successful spring turkey hunt? And he answered... Sharing the wild game culinary experience at the table with friends. While we are not at the table, I did want everyone to have the opportunity to try this amazing dish.

Minnesota Wild Turkey Ramen Soup

Pressure Cooker Wild Turkey Broth Ingredients:

2 Wild Turkey Legs and Thighs1 Whole White Onion

3-4 Whole Carrots

1 Head of Garlic

1/4 Cup of Soy Sauce

2 Celery Ribs

1/8 Cup Whole Pepper corns

1 tablespoon salt

4 sprigs fresh thyme

6-8 leaves Fresh Sage

Water to fill, max fill line of Instant pot. Usually 10-16 cups.

Preparation of Ingredients:

Whole White Onion: Peel and Slice thickly, ½ inch thick slices

Carrots: Peel and cut into 2-3" long chunks.

Quarter the chunks.

Celery Ribs: Wash, Cut into 2-3" long ribs Garlic: Slice entire head in half horizontally.

Put all ingredients into the instant pot, turkey legs first. I usually put soy sauce and water in together, then at the very end I add the herbs.

Cook on High Pressure setting for 2 hours. Let cool. Strain out the broth from the vegetables. Reserve the Turkey legs and thighs. You can remove the many thin sliver bones from the thigs and legs and the dark brown meat can be enjoyed in soup.

This broth can be made with chicken wings instead of turkey legs. In this case omit the sage and reduce the cook time to 45 minutes. This version will have a much higher gelatin content than the wild turkey version but is still delicious.

This broth is the backbone for many soups or sauces: My favorite way to enjoy it is in Turkey Ramen. Combine $2\frac{1}{2}$ cups of the broth with a ramen rice noodle and fresh veggies of your choice. Add Shitake mush-



rooms and some of the reserved leg meat for the umami. Cook until the noodles are soft. I usually add soy sauce to the bowl and then pour the cooked soup in mixing at the very end.



Persons with Disabilities Column

Hello again from the Director's Desk I hope May was good to you. Summer fishing is coming soon and so is Bass Fishing, so I checked in with the Minnesota DNR to get you setup. According to the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources website https://

index.html Bass: A leap of faith.
In a flash, your fishing line tightens.
You set the hook, your rod dips and the fight is on. Within seconds, there's a flash of green and a bass leaps out of the water. Whether you're out to hook bass from the end of a dock or a tournament angler looking for a new challenge, bass are abundant in Minnesota. You'll find surprisingly nice-sized fish that compare favorably to states farther south in just about any area of Minnesota – both

in big lakes and small, out-of-the-way haunts.

Where to fish - Bass anglers are at home in Minnesota, where fishing is bigger than Paul Bunyan. Big or small, popular or off-the-radar, there's no need to choose just one. You'll find excellent bass fishing north, south, east and west.

More than 2,000 Minnesota lakes support self-sustaining largemouth bass populations. More than 500 support smallmouth bass. And don't forget rivers like the Mississippi, St. Croix, Red Lake, Zumbro and Cloquet.

Spring and fall are good times to fish the shallows for bass, while deeper water is better during summer heat. Weedlines and structure such as logs, tree branches dipping into the water and boulders are excellent spots to try.

What to pack - In Minnesota, the fishing's always on, but be prepared for any type of weather, from heat to snow depending on the season. Many anglers find that using strong rods with heavy line helps to quickly reel in bass that might otherwise get tangled in aquatic plants.



As for bait, live and artificial both work. Next to panfish, bass can be the next easiest fish to catch. but catching them consistently takes skill and knowledge. Bass are a great sportfish. They can be good eating but many anglers are out there to relax and



enjoy nature, for a sense of accomplishment, and to share the good times with others.

When can I fish?

Anglers can fish for smallmouth and largemouth bass starting each year on same day as the walleye and northern pike fishing opener. On that day, an early bass harvest season opens north and east of U.S. Highway 53 from Duluth to International Falls (red area), and



in the rest of the state (green area) there is a catchand-release bass season that runs from the regular harvest season until late May.

In the fall, smallmouth bass fishing is catch-and-release only in most of the state (green area). For more details on seasons and special regulations for individual waters, see Fish Minnesota. https://www.dnr.state.mn.us/fishing/regs.html?section=seaons_and_limits&topic=inland

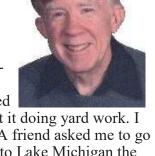


Fishing Tips and Ideas June 2022

Greetings!

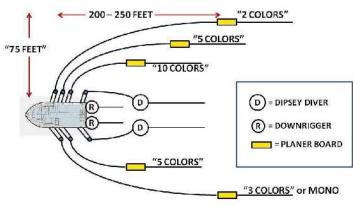
How was your May fishing opener? Mine was a bit of a "let down". Having been fishing by boat for almost 2 months, fishing opener seemed



a little "blah". I actually spent it doing yard work. I had ulterior motives though. A friend asked me to go with on a salmon fishing trip to Lake Michigan the following week so I really wanted to get some things done around the house before the trip.

Fishing out there was spectacular. The first day we got on fish right away and quickly had our limit. A little intel from some of the other anglers helped to in our search.

What I am going to describe below is our basic set up on the boat but even if you are not interested in Great Lakes fishing or trolling for salmon, read on and especially the second half of the article as I think we could all use and apply some of these techniques for Walleye, Crappies and even Muskie!



We utilized a combination of mono and leadcore lines, dipsey divers, downriggers and planer boards. The basic rule is to put the highest running lines furthest out from the boat with the 2 downriggers out from the 2 back corners of the boat. The 2 dipsey divers were just slightly out from the corners of the boat and ran somewhere in the 30 feet deep range. We started the downriggers at 50 feet deep or so but moved them up to 25 to 35 feet deep when we realized the fish were running at that depth.

The leadcore lines were set to give us a range of depths. "2 COLORS" means that there were 2 colors of leadcore line on that set up. There was typically 30 -50' of leader, leadcore (at 10 yards per color with a

sinking rate of 5' per color), a short section of mono to facilitate easier attachment to the planer board and then tons of braid backing! This means our leadcore lines ran at 10' (2 colors), 15' (3 colors), 25' (5 colors) and so on. The planer boards gave us a great spread.

In terms of lures, we ran what are called peanut flies, trolling spoons and even some crankbaits (like pink X-Raps). Mixing in and out various colors and patterns soon told us which colors they wanted right then. Most of our fish were Coho Salmon in the 3-6# range with some Steelhead and King Salmon mixed in. The Kings were in the 6-12# range. By the 4th day we had so much salmon we were releasing 12# Kings like the one pictured below!! Like another guy said "never done that before!" Other fish were released by the side of the boat so as not to harm them.

All in all it was a fantastic outing and I feel blessed I



was able to participate in the fun.

New techniques for walleye, crappie and muskie?? Slowly, some of the same techniques we used on Lake Michigan are moving into the Walleye, Crappie, Bass, and Muskie fishing worlds. I've been using leadcore line some on the St. Croix River with good success.

In 2013, Tommy Skarlis, a native of Iowa, took the Crappie world by storm when he won the Crappie Masters National Championship. His secret? Using planer boards and torpedo divers to get down and away from the boat. Tommy realized that you can take some of these techniques used for Big Water fishing and apply them not only to walleye fishing but to Crappie fishing as well. More about that next time!!

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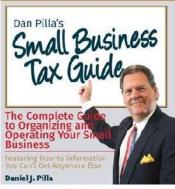
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
