Letter From CEO TOM GOODRICH

Partnering Together to Meet Our Community's Needs

At Fishing For Life, we are incredibly grateful for the support of our donors, volunteers, and partners who help us provide valuable programs to youth, families, veterans, and communities through fishing and outdoor activities. Our purpose is to foster personal growth, resilience, and spiritual connection through the great outdoors remains strong, but like many non-profits, we are facing funding challenges that threaten our ability to serve those who depend on us.

Our Current Needs and Funding Gaps

Our community programming, which includes camps, mentorship programs, and lake events like Pike Fest, Badges and Bobbers, and the Amigos Lake Event, relies on donations and sponsorships. These initiatives have become vital sources of support and encouragement for participants—particularly for youth in under-served communities, veterans, and families who might not otherwise have access to such opportunities.

Unfortunately, we've encountered several shortfalls in funding that impact our ability to expand and sustain these transformative programs. Rising costs for materials, equipment, transportation, and program coordination have created unexpected challenges, and our current resources are not enough to keep up with growing demands.

The Impact of Every Dollar Donated

- \$25 can provide a young person with a day of fishing and mentorship at one of our camps.
- \$50 helps cover the cost of fishing equipment and safety gear for participants.

- \$500-\$1,000 supports the planning and execution of large-scale events, such as our Youth Fishing Camps and Military Relationships through Recreation (R&R), where we foster skill development, personal growth, and spiritual exploration.

In our last Jimmy Journal, we had a vehicle donation request. And while we are still in search of a vehicle such as a truck or large SUV to pull our program trailers, this request was answered in ways we never would have dreamed.

Shortly after the article was out, J.C. Younger Chillers Inc., was in contact with us to fill a need we had not even published. Our old box truck, lovingly named Dino, as it is like an old dinosaur, was in need of replacement.

This story starts years ago when a relationship was forged between Fishing For Life and the J.C. Younger Chillers Corporation which began with an experiment aimed to find a solution to keep our trout pond water temperatures manageable during hot summer months.

Their commitment reached new heights when owner Sandy Younger called to donate a much-needed box truck. This truck is going to help transform the way we execute our programming. The truck now joins our fleet, enabling us to transport our program supplies in a professional and organized way, that is safe and reliable. It's a valuable asset that will help us reach even more youth and veterans, making outdoor activities more accessible and enriching our ability to share the therapeutic and recreational benefits of fishing.

J.C. Younger Corporation's impact on our mission speaks volumes, and we are immensely grateful for their ongoing support. Thank you, Sandy, and the entire J.C. Younger team, for your incredible generosity and partnership!

Around this time another generous donor came forward. With the many fishing events we put on spring through the fall we have always struggled with the need for pontoons that can hold a full family or group at events. This spring when the need was more prominent, we received outreach about a pontoon donation that has been a gift that keeps on giving. After reaching out through our website, a donor generously offered their pristine, two-year-old Sylvan pontoon, equipped with a 90 hp Honda engine, a live well, a Bimini top, and even sea legs. She simply wanted it to be put to good use, helping others experience the joy of the outdoors.

Just weeks later, we had the ideal event lined up—a fishing day for women veterans, hosted by our Outdoor Women for Life group on Medicine Lake. We welcomed six women veterans and two children, setting out with the goal to catch some fish, enjoy the lake, and share stories. The pontoon became not just a fishing platform but a place of connection, laughter, and meaningful exchanges among the veterans. It was a day that honored both our community's purpose and the donor's generosity, embodying the essence of Fishing For Life—bringing people together at the intersection of the Great Commission and the Great Outdoors.

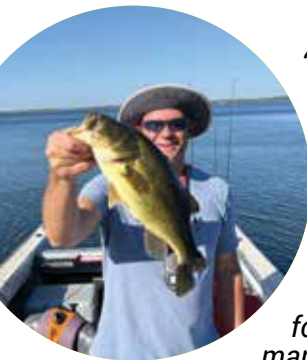
FEEL THE IMPACT!

Reel Hope

Empowering Youth through Fishing and Outdoor Programs



In May of this year, Fishing For Life launched a new grant-funded program called Reel Hope. This initiative aims to support youth-serving organizations, ministries, churches, schools, and law enforcement in helping at-risk youth engage positively with their communities, learn new skills, and build resilience.

Reel Hope operates in three distinct phases. In phase one, participants attend a Reel 'Em In (REI) event, where they are introduced to the basic equipment needed for fishing. During this event, they restore rods, reels, and tackle, which they then keep. Phase two involves a hands-on fishing event at a local dock, pier, or shore location, where participants learn to use the equipment they received and gain guidance on finding and catching fish. Youth who complete the first two phases qualify for the final phase: a chartered boat trip to Lake Mille Lacs.

Since the program's inception through October, 49 youth have completed phase one, 23 have completed phase two, and the first charter boat launch has been successfully conducted. In August, events were held in partnership with Calvary Lutheran Church in Golden Valley, Hospitality House in Minneapolis, and the Ramsey County Sheriff's Office in Little Canada. The Mille Lacs charter trip capped off the month with great success.

In October, Fishing For Life had the privilege of hosting a two-day REI event at Coon Rapids High School as part of an elective class. Plans are underway to host similar events twice more during the winter trimester. Looking forward, the organization is building new partnerships and preparing for winter and ice fishing activities.

In addition to Reel Hope events, Fishing For Life collaborates with the cities of Lonsdale, Plymouth, and West St. Paul for their Badges & Bobbers events, as well as with the Anoka County Sheriff's Department for their Community and Sheriffs Together (CAST) event. These events provide youth with unique opportunities to learn about fishing and interact positively with firefighters, deputies, and police officers.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

During one REI event for Reel Hope, a homeless student who had barely been attending school chose to participate upon learning the event would be about fishing. Volunteers taught him about fishing and had meaningful conversations with him about his life.

At a Badges & Bobbers event, a brother and sister, who had never been fishing or on a boat, got to experience both for the first time. The brother even won a prize for the largest bass!

At a Reel Hope lake event at Centennial Lakes Park in Edina, youth discovered a fishing spot near their homes that they had never visited. They were thrilled to catch hundreds of bluegills during the afternoon and continued fishing even after the event ended, staying until their parents arrived.

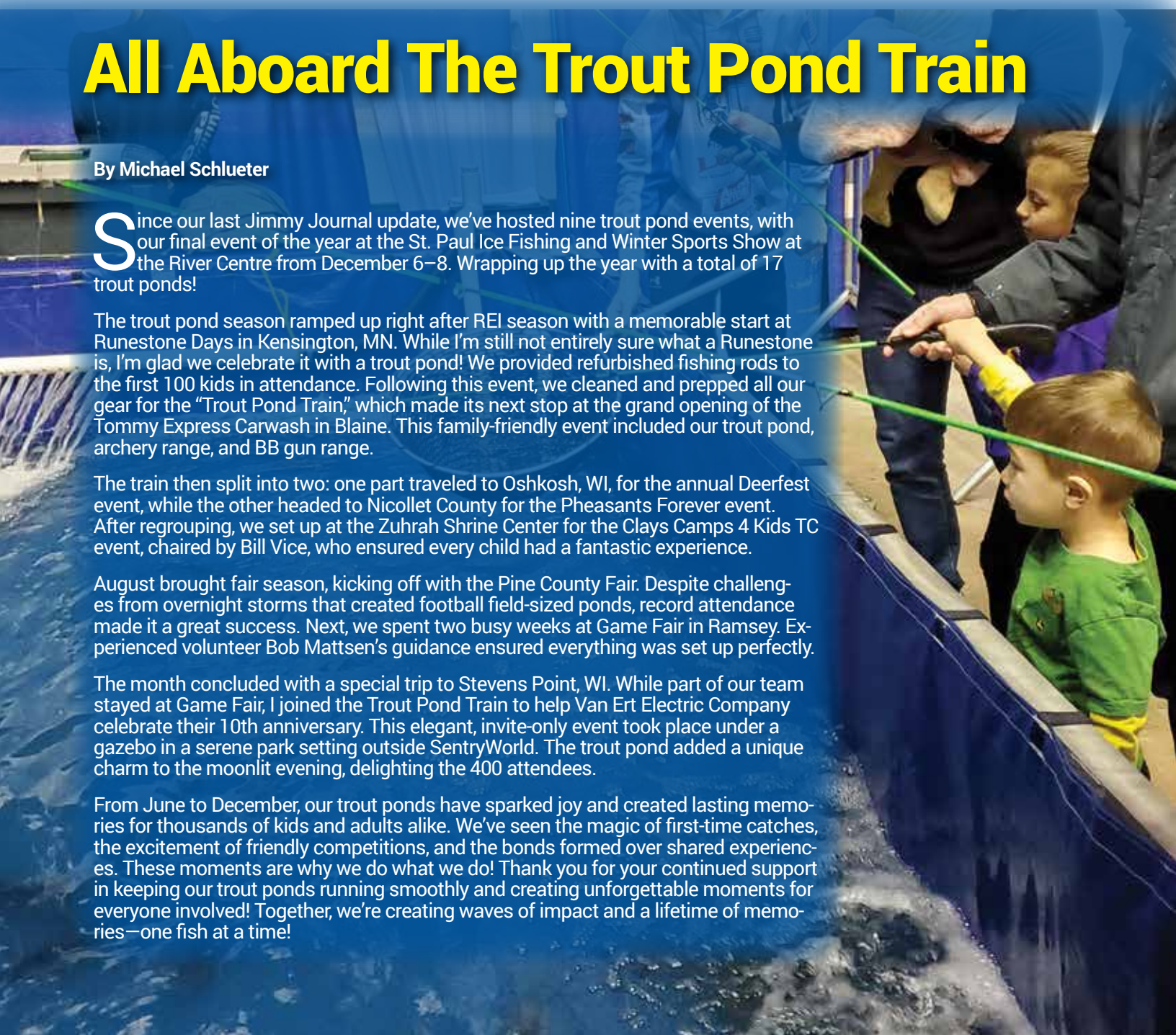

Next, we spent two busy weeks at Game Fair in Ramsey. Experienced volunteer Bob Mattsen's guidance ensured everything was set up perfectly.

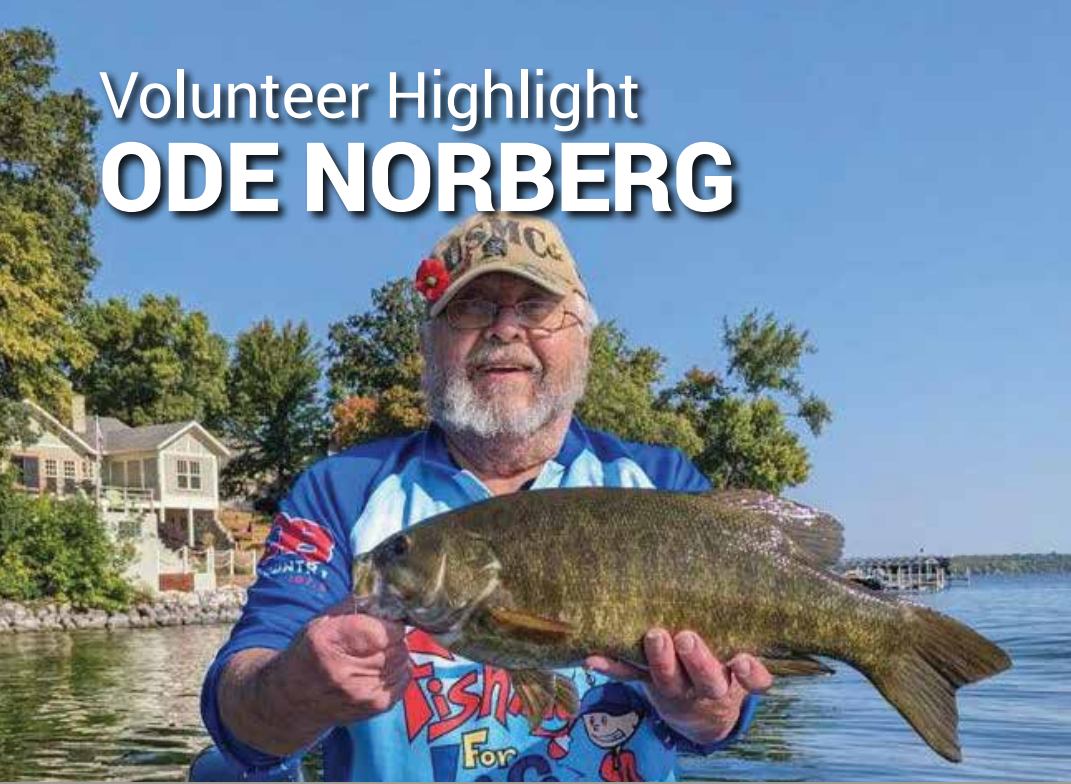

That's when we got to talking about fishing. Knowing I dabbled in scroll saw work, he asked if I'd donate some pieces to a silent auction for Fishing For Life. That's when I met Vaughn, who invited me to the Fishing For Life banquet. I love hunting and fishing although I didn't have a boat. After meeting so many great people, I was hooked! It was then that I started volunteering at events like REI. This was all a new part of my plan for how I would spend my retirement.

Instead, I continued to assist with shore fishing, pontoon events, and cleaning tackle at REI events. One day, I displayed 40 tackle boxes in my front yard to dry after cleaning them. This sparked many conversations with my neighbors about my involvement with FFL. It was another great opportunity to share the work I love. Nowadays, I get nervous if I don't hear from the REI coordinator for a few days. I'll contact him to make sure he has plenty for me to do. I feel the most comfortable when I'm up to my neck in used tackle. I cherish the opportunities that have been available to me by Fishing For Life!





“Reeling Them In” Through Our REI Program

2024 has been an incredible year for Fishing For Life and our Reel 'Em In (REI) program! Through heartfelt experiences and impactful events, we've touched the lives of countless individuals in our local communities and across the country. From those who generously donated equipment to the many groups and individuals who received it, the gratitude for these blessings runs deep.

While every event this year deserves its own story, here's a snapshot of some highlights, along with volunteer attendance numbers:

- **May 23 – Osseo American Legion: 25 attendees**
- **May 30 – Cummins, Fridley: 30 attendees**
- **June 6 – Egan Companies: 50 attendees**
- **Sept 12 – Cummins, Fridley: 45 attendees**
- **Oct 16 – Premier Pontoon: 113 attendees**

This year brought exciting new opportunities for the REI program. Cummins was so inspired by the success of our spring event that they invited us back for a second event in September. Additionally, we hosted a large-scale REI event at Premier Pontoon in Big Lake, creating even more chances to put fishing gear in the hands of kids and veterans.

BY THE NUMBERS: EQUIPMENT DISTRIBUTED

To date (January – October), we've distributed **1,433 fishing rod/reel combos** and **270 tackle boxes** to school programs, community organizations, and our internal events like camps, Badges & Bobbers, and veteran programs.

The Premier Pontoon REI event alone helped us refurbish and produce:

- **320 Rod/Reel Combos**

- **30 Tackle Boxes**
- **160 Plano/Hook Boxes**
- **50 Ice Rod/Reel Combos**
- **30 Jigging Sticks**
- **30 Tip-Ups**

STRENGTHENING OUR MISSION

This year also brought practical upgrades to support our mission. Thanks to Mill City Paper, we've added new racking systems to better organize donated items in our semi-trailer. Additionally, J.C. Younger Company, Inc. donated a box truck to replace our beloved but broken truck, "Dino." This timely and generous contribution ensures we can continue transporting equipment efficiently.

None of this would be possible without the amazing volunteers who dedicate their time to making the REI program a success. These events not only provide valuable resources but also serve our ultimate goal: to lead others to a relationship with Jesus Christ.
