Letter From CEO TOM GOODRICH

Warm greetings from all of us at Fishing For Life. On behalf of our staff and board, thank you for being a vital part of our mission, vision, and family!

At our core, Fishing For Life is about so much more than outdoor adventures. Whether it's through our mobile trout ponds, rod and reel rebuilds, fishing and camping events, or moments of fellowship—we are here to touch individual lives. The true transformation we seek comes from the power of Christ, and our goal is to simply be the fragrance of Jesus—drawing people in with His love until they find their way back to a committed Christian community.

Here is a glimpse into our programs and the hopes behind each one:

Reel Hope

Our heart is to reach youth in hard-to-reach environments, with a focus on empowering at-risk youth— especially those facing family instability or socioeconomic challenges. We provide opportunities for outdoor experiences they might not otherwise have. Through multiple events and intentional relationship-building, we point them toward Christ and deeper experiences in nature.

REI (Reel 'Em In)

We aim to mobilize hundreds of volunteers into the mission of Fishing For Life by providing meaningful opportunities to serve. These experiences invite volunteers to move deeper into our programming, purpose, and impact.

Trout Ponds

We offer many children their very first fishing experience through our mobile trout ponds. This simple and joyful moment introduces them to the broader mission of Fishing For Life and provides an easy, impactful way for volunteers to serve outdoors.

Camps

Our camps are some of the richest experiences we offer—both for youth and veterans. Through immersive outdoor adventures and powerful spiritual programming, we fast-track life change and deepen relationships with Christ.

Military Relationships through Recreation (R&R)

We come alongside soldiers and their families from

all branches and all eras of service. Through outdoor-based events, expert-led sessions, and strong community engagement, we offer support for spiritual, emotional, and physical healing—often reaching those who feel isolated. Some events include the entire family, offering a path forward in faith and community.

OWLs (Outdoor Women for Life)

A safe, welcoming, and judgment-free space for women to grow in Christ. Bonds are formed and strengthened through outdoor activities and Bible studies offered throughout the year.

Deep C's

Our monthly men's gatherings create a safe, supportive environment for connection, discipleship, and personal growth. Whether participating or leading, every man is encouraged to grow in faith and engage in our mission.

Special Events

Events such as our Spring Gala and Pastor's Fishing Tournament in late summer bring supporters of our mission together in fellowship, fostering community and opening doors to new partnerships.

Our Chaplain

Though not a program, Chaplain Vaughn provides a spiritual covering for all we do. He serves as a trusted point of contact for volunteers and participants alike—offering prayer, guidance, and Christ-centered care. He meets people where they are and supports them on their journey with God.

As we look ahead, we see a future filled with more opportunities to serve, more of God's nature to share, and more lives to impact. JOURNEY TO A GOLD SEAL OF TRANSPARENCY



or over two decades, Fishing For Life has been dedicated to serving youth, families, veterans, and communities through faith-based fishing and outdoor programs. While its mission and impact have always been strong, the organization's journey toward greater transparency and credibility has been a strategic effort. Today, Fishing For Life proudly holds the Gold Seal of Transparency on GuideStar (Candid)—a significant achievement that demonstrates its commitment to openness, accountability, and trustworthiness.

HUMBLE BEGINNINGS: NO RATING, JUST PASSION

In its early years, Fishing For Life operated with a strong vision and grassroots support but lacked formal recognition on nonprofit evaluation platforms. Like many small nonprofits, it focused primarily on its mission—providing outdoor programs, mentoring, and community engagement—rather than on documenting and showcasing its financial, impact, and governance.

While the passion and dedication of its leadership and volunteers were evident, potential donors and grant makers often sought more assurance regarding financial stewardship and organizational transparency. This realization prompted Fishing For Life to begin building a stronger public profile.

EARNING THE BRONZE SEAL: TAKING THE FIRST STEP

The first milestone came when Fishing For Life achieved the **Bronze Seal of Transparency** on GuideStar. This required the organization to provide basic information, such as its mission statement, leadership details, and foundational structure. While this was a step in the right direction, it became clear that deeper transparency would be necessary to secure larger grants and broader community support.

ADVANCING TO SILVER: STRENGTHENING FINANCIAL AND PROGRAM DETAILS

Building upon its Bronze recognition, Fishing For Life worked to enhance its profile by sharing financial data, program descriptions, and measurable outcomes. This led to earning the **Silver Seal of Transparency**, which indicated a higher level of accountability and credibility. The organization provided insight into how funds were allocated, demonstrating that donations were being used effectively to support youth camps, veteran programs, and community outreach initiatives.

ACHIEVING THE GOLD SEAL: A TESTAMENT TO IMPACT

Understanding the importance of continuous improvement, Fishing For Life took the next step to achieve the **Gold Seal**

of Transparency. This level required more comprehensive reporting, including:

- Detailed financial statements and IRS Form 990 filings.
- Clear goals, strategies, and program descriptions.
- Impact metrics showcasing how Fishing For Life changes lives through its programs.
- Information on board governance, leadership, and longterm sustainability efforts.

By reaching the Gold Seal, Fishing For Life has positioned itself as a **trustworthy and responsible** nonprofit, making it more attractive to donors, sponsors, and grant makers who seek organizations that demonstrate fiscal responsibility and measurable impact.

WHAT'S NEXT? THE ROAD TO PLATINUM

While the Gold Seal is a remarkable accomplishment, Fishing For Life continues to strive for greater excellence. The goal is to achieve the **Platinum Seal of Transparency**, the highest level on GuideStar, which focuses on **impact measurement** and **long-term effectiveness**. This would require even more data on program success, participant testimonials, and long-term community benefits.

WHY TRANSPARENCY MATTERS

Fishing For Life's journey from no rating to **Bronze**, **Silver**, **and now Gold** demonstrates a deep commitment to ethical nonprofit management. Transparency builds trust, attracts donors, and ensures the organization can continue making a meaningful impact in the lives of youth, veterans, and families through its outdoor ministry.

With a Gold Seal of Transparency, Fishing For Life is now better positioned than ever to expand its reach, secure additional funding, and continue changing lives—one fishing trip at a time.

ello Fishing For Life friends,

If you had the opportunity to meet Michael in person, you know what a gift he was. His time with us feels far too short, and I wasn't ready for his pass-

ing. The truth is, I'll never be able to replace him—but I hope these words give you a glimpse of who he was and what he

meant to all of us.

Michael and I first met through a good friend connected to the Minnetonka fishing team. I was looking for help with my small business, Midwest Shrink wrap. Michael had just retired from a marine dealership and was open to part-time work, From the beginning, I found him engaging and quick on his feet. So. I handed him a hot blow torch and set him to shrink-wrapping boats. What I discovered was a man with many talents and a deep desire to serve others.

Soon after, Michael joined Fishing For Life, helping with our Trout Ponds and the Reel 'Em In program. These roles require more than just logistics—they demand flexibility, a public presence, and the ability to win over volunteers, which is such a strong component of all FFL programming.

Michael could do it all, and he did it with enthusiasm. Tireless in his work, he also took great leaps in his faith, growing steadily and humbly. He decided to get baptized during his tenure with us too!

He had a hard time saying no. I often had to remind him not to burn himself out, but Micheal loved working and being with people, something that came easy to him. He recruited countless volunteers for the Trout Pond, often traveling long distances to set them up and run them. One of the most rewarding moments for him was helping a child catch trout for the first time—and getting to do so with his own grandchildren in St. Louis was a blessing he cherished.

Michael also took the Reel 'Em In program to new heights. Collecting, rebuilding, and redistributing rods and reels is

no small task, but he embraced the challenge and grew the program significantly.

Then, suddenly, we got the news. Michael had cancer. We never fully understood how serious it was until it had already spread to his brain. And just like that, he was gone. We are left with the memory of a wonderful man and the difficult task of finding someone who can love as deeply and serve as faithfully as he did. I cannot wait to see him in heaven. I will

Reel Hope

Empowering Youth through Fishing and Outdoor Programs

"I really like that we get to make rods. I needed a new one and since my family stopped fishing I would like to take it upon myself to get out and go fish."

n May of 2024, Fishing for Life (FFL) launched a new grant-funded program called Reel Hope, which is designed to come alongside youth-serving organizations, ministries, churches, schools, and law enforcement to help at-risk youth engage positively with their communities, learn new skills, and build resilience. Our goal with this program is to connect with youth in hard-to-reach environments such as single-parent homes and out-of-home placement and give them an opportunity for outdoor experiences they may not otherwise get. FFL has the opportunity through multiple events to build lasting relationships with these youth and provide deeper outdoor experiences. Above all, we get to point them to Christ and the hope that is only found in Him!

Reel Hope is one program in three phases. In the first phase, participants attend a Reel 'Em In workshop, or REI for short. At this event, participants are taught about the basics and benefits of fishing, and our volunteers also work with them to restore and refurbish rods, reels, and tackle, which they will get to keep. They bring this equipment with them to the second phase, which is a fishing event at a local dock, pier, or shore location. There they are taught how to use their equipment and receive instruction on where to find fish and how to catch them. Youth who participate in the first two phases are eligible for the third and final phase, which is a charter boat trip to Mille Lacs Lake in August.

We are pleased to report that since January of this year, we have had 98 youth complete phase one and 88 youth complete phase two.

In January, we once again had the privilege of being invited into the Coon Rapids High School and hosting a two-day REI event there as part of an elective class. As a result, we were also invited into the Anoka and Andover High Schools to do the same event with the students in those schools in April. We also did a lake event with those groups of students in May, which will be discussed in more detail in the highlights section.

Some other organizations we've had the honor of working with this year are Lakeside Academy, Redeeming Love Church, and the DinoMights hockey team.

In addition to the Reel Hope events, there are two other standalone events that fall under the Reel Hope program. Our Badges & Bobbers events and our Community and Sheriffs Together event in Anoka County all provide a unique opportunity for kids to learn about fishing and catch fish while having positive interactions with firefighters and law enforcement officers. We were able to once again hold our annual Badges & Bobbers events in partnership with the cities of Lonsdale and Plymouth in June. The event with the Anoka County Sheriff's Office is scheduled for Friday, August 1, at Lake George in Oak Grove.



Highlights

There are 16 Reel Hope events that have taken place between January and June of this year. Here are some of the highlights.

In January we were privileged to partner with Lakeside Academy in Buffalo to do a Reel 'Em In workshop and an ice fishing lake event. One of the students had only been ice fishing a handful of times and never caught a fish through the ice. After a few minutes of instruction on how to read the sonar, how to get a fish to bite, and how to land it, he sent his small jig tipped with a waxworm down the hole to a waiting school of crappies. As he was watching his jig go down on the screen, he watched a crappie come up from the bottom to meet it. He closed the bail, and the fish bit immediately. A few minutes later he had a nice 12-inch crappie on top of the ice. His response was, "That wasn't so hard." We assured him it wouldn't always be that easy!

In April we had the distinct honor of being invited into the Anoka and Andover High Schools to do a two-day Reel 'Em In workshop with each of them. Our staff and volunteers worked with 36 students between the two schools to teach them about conservation and the basics and benefits of fishing, as well as how to repair fishing equipment and set it up correctly. Some of the students received their very own fishing gear for the first time.

In May we organized two separate lake events for the Coon Rapids High School and the Anoka/Andover High Schools at the Coon Rapids Dam. Through this experience, the students were taught about perseverance, learning through adversity, what to do with success, and how to leave a legacy. One highlight of these two events was that of a young woman who had some experience fishing but had never caught a northern. She mentioned at the Reel 'Em In event that it was a goal of hers to catch a northern during the upcoming fishing trip, and she caught her first one at the Coon Rapids dam!

In June we partnered with the DinoMights hockey team to do the normal Reel Hope events consisting of a Reel 'Em In workshop on the first day and a shore fishing lake event on the second day. On the first day after the students had received their fishing equipment, they were so excited that they couldn't wait and went out that same day on their own to a nearby pond and started catching fish! In addition to the Reel Hope events, there was also a third day added where the students were brought out to fish from boats on Medicine Lake. The sunfish and bluegill bite were exceptional in the afternoon, with one boat bringing in close to 80 fish and another bringing in over 100!
